Letter from the President

Have you heard about the EU import restrictions?

There are two major changes to export restrictions to the EU that will effect our industry. Both are outlined below:

- 1. The EU *did* declare that they will no longer accept hard maple (*Acer saccharum*) logs and veneer sheets from states such as Michigan, New York, North Carolina, Vermont and Wisconsin. The effort is to eradicate the importation of sap streak disease (*Davidsoniella virescens*). **However**, according to the USDA-APHIS the EU is in the process of revamping the restrictions to ensure they **will** continue to accept hard maple logs and veneer sheets. The Phytosanitary Certificate must include "KD" (kiln dried) and "HT" (heat treated) on the documentation. I encourage you to reach out to your local Phytosanitary inspector for more details.
- 2. The EU has proposed a more stringent import procedure to identify location of lumber from around the world. The proposal states that geolocation of the importation of hardwood material must be included in shipments to adhere to the new Deforestation Law that has been put in place. Michigan **Configured WI Institute for Sustainable Technology** Trucks

Summer recess and in the midst of its Fall legisla-

tive session. The Lake States Lumber Association is actively promoting legislation to expand the current network of routes in northern Wisconsin which allows operators hauling forest products to run "Michigan Configured" log trucks.

Senate Bill 484 authored by Sen. Cory Tomczyk (R-Mosinee) and co-authored by Rep. Jeff Mursau (R-Crivitz) adds an additional nine routes to the existing cyclability certification for 30 companies; provide network of Michigan border timber routes. Efficient product accreditation for 18 companies; and help deand affordable transportation continues to be a key velop new commercial products for five companies. issue for LSLA members. The addition of these routes, many along corridors where rail service was once available, will result in cost savings for shippers.

A public hearing will be held in the Senate Transportation and Local Government Committee in late October. Lake States Lumber Association members and leadership have been actively working on this issue with the Great Lakes Timber Producers Association and the Wisconsin Department of Transportation for the past several months. We are thankful for this productive partnership which continues to support the forestry industry in Wisconsin.

Senate Bill 449 was recently introduced by Sen. How-The Wisconsin State Leg- ard Marklein (R-Spring Green) and co-authored by islature is back from Rep. Travis Tranel (R-Cuba City). This bill creates a \$250,000 annual appropriation from the State's general fund ending in the 2024-25 biennium. The Wisconsin Institute of Sustainable Technology (WIST) at the University of Wisconsin-Stevens Point provides research, laboratory services and education to the paper industry. According to the authors, the additional funds will allow WIST to hire a technician and papermaking specialist to: provide specialized commercial paper products for 12 companies; do product re-In addition, it will support the executive director to lead near-to-market forest products industry innovation and diversification. Bipartisan House Lawmakers Introduce "Jobs in jobs in the forest sector. Rep. Chavez-Deremer (Rthe Woods Act"

In recent years, the hardwood industry has identified workforce development to address chronic staffing shortages as a key hindrance to economic growth, with nearly 60% of respondents to a December 2022 survey ranking the issue as a high priority. In early September, Reps. Lori Chavez-DeRemer (R-OR) and Marie Gluesenkamp Perez (D-WA), both members of the Agriculture Committee, introduced the bipartisan Jobs in the Woods Act (H.R. 5344). This important legislation will create a grant program that promotes jobs in the understaffed timber industry and U.S. Forest Service. Specifically, the bill seeks to:

- Establish education programs for states, nonprofits, and colleges through grants of \$500,000-\$2,000,000.

The Hardwood Federation has joined nearly 60 forestry and forest product associations to sign on in support of the bill. Industry notes that "targeted workforce education and training programs have been effective recruitment tools in computer programming, utility vegetation management, and automotive industries" and could therefore address the needs of the forest sector. To bolster rural economies, the bill's supporters state that "regional forest industry training hubs would allow participants to stay in or near their communities, which reduces the cost to participate" and allows program managers "to meet regional needs through ties to local forest product employers."

Fortunately for industry, House champions of the bill have been vocal about their support for promoting

The congresswoman goes on to remark that the bipartisan bill "will help expand education opportunities in an effort to grow our workforce." The congresswoman's colleague and bill cosponsor, Rep. Marie Gluesenkamp Perez (D-WA), has stated that "the only way we'll keep the woods working for future generations is if we provide the next generation a pathway to pursue careers in forestry." She goes on to state that this "bipartisan bill will make that possible and connect people to careers in this critical field that is essential to southwest Washington."


